Hunting Safety for Hikers

Autumn can be one of the best times for hiking. The weather is perfect and the colors are vibrant. This time of the year also presents challenges for hikers, bikers and paddlers. We share the woods with another group of outdoors men and women, hunters and fishers. A majority of incidents that happen between hikers and hunters can be traced back to the hikers not exercising proper etiquette while hiking during the hunting season. All those who engage in fall outdoor activities should know where and when hunting and fishing is allowed in NY. There are simple things you can do to make sure that you can enjoy the outdoors while also keeping yourself safe. We will look at how to dress safely, where avoid around WNY and when, and what the different seasons mean for recreation activities for our club members.

Anyone interested in gaining a more in depth understanding of local and state wide conservation issues is invited to attend the club's Conservation Committee meetings. State wide the Invasive Species act passed the NYS legislation to require all types of watercraft to be cleaned prior to launching to minimize the spread of invasive water plants and animals. The ATV bill that would have allowed utility vehicles over 1500 pounds to be used as recreational vehicles was defeated. These heavier vehicle would have caused even more damage to the environment than the smaller ATVs. Concern is growing over the transportation of heavy crude oil in railroad cars that are not designed to carry flammable liquids. This is a concern as they travel both through urban areas across NYS including Buffalo and along waterways in the Adirondacks. ADK and other groups recommended that the proposed unit management plan for the Essex Chain of Lakes in the Adirondacks be temporarily rescinded because it did not address several areas of concern such as snowmobile trails, parking areas, and opening some roads to seasonal motorized vehicle use etc. Currently the public can access the area with a permit until the DEC submits a new UMP. Urgent request for E-mail to lobby for a natural park in Buffalo's Outer Harbor

The Conservation and Executive Committees of the Niagara Frontier Chapter of ADK have reviewed the Erie Canal Harbor Development Corporations (ECHDC) plan for developing Buffalo's Outer Harbor. The plan has sacrificed the natural values of this shoreline for the development of commercial real-estate. The 2000 residences in 3-4 story buildings will deny meaningful access to the vast majority of Western New Yorkers.

We therefor ask you to email ECDHC at: OuterHarborInfo@esd.ny.gov as soon as possible to express your feelings about this hasty plan.

Possible points to make in your email might include:

1. Close proximity of housing to Times Beach and Wilkerson Point will disturb wild life, particularly bird flight paths and end their usefulness as Nature Preserves.

2. Residents, their homes, their parking spaces and their priorities will greatly limit the use of the outer harbor to the rest of the community.

3. A Presque Isle like natural Park on our outer Harbor would greatly enhance the attractiveness of downtown Buffalo to business and for living.

4. Such a park need not in itself pay for its maintenance. The surrounding city benefitted by it should pay for it.

5. Existing buildings on the outer harbor should be refitted for Park purposes, concerts, restaurants, restrooms, even an indoor outdoor swimming pool has been suggested.

Outings Committee Words from the Outings Committee

Autumn is here! The weather and the colors make this time of year a great chance to get outdoors. But we all need to make sure we are safe this time of the year. Most people are unaware that hunting season started for geese and some small game on September 1st. Bow season for most other animals starts October 1st. This makes it doubly important for hikers, bikers and boaters to observe proper outdoor etiquette and make sure they keep themselves safe. Responsible hunters take precautions to make sure they are seen and avoid crossing the shooting lanes of other hunters. Please make sure if you are hiking that you check to see if hunting is allowed in the area you are going. Information can be found on the New York State DEC site or by picking up a booklet at any store which sells sporting licenses. Out October education session will deal directly with this.

If you do go out please wear bright colors. Safety orange is the best as it can be seen in the woods at great distances. No need to spend a lot of money on safety vest from the bigger stores when many time you can find them at places like Dollar General for 3-4 dollars. Boaters should also consider wearing high visibility clothing or having something marking their boats so duck hunters can see them. Stay on trails and when boating avoid large flocks of birds.

Thank you to our new Winter Sports Co-Chair, JoAnn Ratajczak, for volunteering to help the club out. Starting in November all outings having to do with XC Skiing, snowshoeing and other winter activities should be sent to her. We are still looking for a Day Hiking Co-Chair starting next April. As always we are looking for outings. If you have fallen behind on the Wilderness Weekend Challenge this is a great time to get back into it. Remember you don't need to plan months ahead for outings. If you find yourself heading out on the weekend and can let us know with at least a few days' notice we would be happy to include it in the weekly reminders, on the website, Facebook and Meetup. As always be safe in the outdoors, always know where your towel is, and don't forget your liability forms.

Susquehannock Lodge Fall Weekend (C)

Once again ADK members can enjoy a weekend at the Susquehannock Lodge during the fall foliage season. This is a great weekend for both new and old members. The lodge provides accommodations and great meals. All we have to do is enjoy. This year, we have added the option of a Thursday night arrival to allow for a full day of hiking/exploring on Friday for those who wish to do so. On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, most of us hike in the adjacent Susquehannock State Forest, where there are numerous trails of various lengths. Participants also have the option to tour the nearby PA Lumber Museum, or drive into either Coudersport (west) or Wellsboro (east). Twenty-five miles east is PA's Grand Canyon of the East, which offers trails on both sides and also a "rails to trails" hiking/biking trail along Pine Creek. The lodge is located just east of Coudersport, Pa., about two hours south of Buffalo. Cost for the 2-day weekend is \$114pp semi private/ \$124pp private (based on double occupancy), and includes 2 breakfasts and 2 dinners. Those opting for the added Thursday night stay pay an additional \$57.00 per person for semi-private and \$62.00 pp for double occupancy private. Single private is available at an additional charge. Trail lunches are available for purchase, or you can bring your own lunch for Saturday. A deposit of \$55 is required on signing up.

TRIP REPORTS

Trip Report, Lows Lake Paddle and Camp, August 22nd

Seven people including Richard and Mary Schraven, my husband Dick Hacker and I, Manon Paquet, Marion Hanover and Vito Fasano went on a two night paddling trip to Lows Lake, which is just south of Tupper Lake in the ADK's. We drove up Friday morning and paddled in through the Bog River, Hitchens Pond and up into Lows lake site 15 which is at the edge of the main part of the lake. We were lucky to get such a nice site since the area was full of other groups enjoying this beautiful area. On Saturday we paddled to the Grass Pond area at the north part of the lake and hiked up part of the lightly used canoe carry that goes to Cranberry Lake. In the future I would like to do a trip that includes paddling from the Bog River dam, up through Lows, portaging this 3.5 mile trail to Cranberry and out through Wanakena, which is a little village on the edge of Cranberry. We paddled back through the north part of the lake which has a couple of easy short portages and is a great route to avoid the afternoon wind and waves on the lake. It is also a loon nesting area, although the loon nesting season is earlier in the year. As always we saw many loons in the area. Fortunately it wasn't very windy and we had a beautiful evening with a nice campfire built and stoked by Marian and Vito. The air was clear, allowing us to see millions of stars. Mary stayed back at the camp during the day and enjoyed a day relaxing in the woods. In the morning, after the morning fog lifted and a couple of people went for a swim we left and paddled to the Lows lake dam area where there is a one mile trail to an overlook where we could see for miles from the high peaks to way west of the area.
